Jenkins Bros Houses E. Liberty (1912, 1908)
American Foursquare and Craftsman style bungalows. The Jenkins were Trap shooting pioneers and champions.



(Ochs) Alvis House 192 W. Jefferson (1923)
The Ochs family from Germany founded Ochs Furniture & Undertaking in 1860.

Herle House 188 E. Jefferson (1930)
California bungalow. Also operated the popular eatery Herle's Café downtown.



Conder-Coppock House 200 W. Jefferson (c. 1877)
Second Empire style architecture.

1 of 2 original hotels.



Kirby Hardware 206 E. Jefferson (1880)
